LONDINIUM!

In October, a group of year 7 and year 8 students spent a day at the Museum of London finding out about some of the ancient inhabitants of London. During the day the students got the opportunity to discover some amazing things about the lives of these people through the permanent museum exhibition as well as actually handling some of the artefacts that have been found under the streets of modern London. Some students dressed up as citizens of Londinium and everyone took part in writing speeches to encourage the armies of Rome and the ancient Britons under Boudicca. It was a great day out!













Eye Health Awareness

The importance of good eyesight in childhood cannot be overstated. Around 80% of a child's learning occurs visually, yet many children do not see well enough to reach their full potential. There are more than 1 million children in the UK with undetected vision problems.

It is very important that all children have their eyes tested regularly. Signs a child has a problem with their sight include:

- sitting too close to the TV
- rubbing their eyes a lot or blinking a lot
- holding objects very close to their face
- Difficulty in seeing the board at school or words when reading

Even if children do not show any of the above signs, they could still have an underlying eye condition. Once a child's vision has been checked and is shown to be normal, they should continue to have regular eye checks every 1-2 years because problems can occur at any age. Eye tests will ensure any problems such as childhood conditions like squint and amblyopia (lazy eye) or myopia (short-sightedness) are picked up early.

Children aged under 16, or aged 16 to 18 and in full-time education are entitled to a free annual sight test under the NHS at their local optometrist. Should they need to wear glasses, children are also entitled to optical vouchers issued by the

optometrist to help towards the cost.

Foods like tomatoes, melon, grapes and blueberries as well as fish,

chicken, eggs and whole grains are packed with eye—friendly nutrients.

As part of our Eye Health Awareness campaign, YHC members received training from Andrew Davies from Eye Heroes. The YHC were given information about the various eye health problems that can occur, how many people in the UK are affected, activities to promote good eye health and information about eye testing. Students used this training to host their own stand at the recent Health and Well Being Carousel day.



Following on from this training, on Wednesday 8th November the YHC were pleased to invite Bhavin Shah, Behavioural Optometrist / Director of Central Vision Opticians to undertake some student eye screenings. Bhavin completed a range of tests to identify any students who should be referred for more extensive testing.

We would like to thank Andrew and Bhavin for their support with this campaign.



Waltham Forest of Culture



The YHC members not only had to manage the event and look after our guests, but they also had to take it in turns to deliver their own message, the Eye Heroes programme, which aims to raise awareness of the importance of regular eye tests and eye health.

Other information available related to personal safety, healthy relationships, personal safety, stop smoking services, dementia awareness, mental health, healthy eating and drug awareness. Our own School Nurse gave tips and advice on how to manage exam stress and Walthamstow Leisure Centre brought along two bosu balls for the students to test their core stability and balance skills.
